- 4. Old Business
 - a. Social justice-a Committee or a small group?—At the last Parish Council meeting, the representative giving the Peace and Justice Committee report was asked if this was a committee or a small group. We are both. We look at parish policy and actions through a social justice lens and make suggestions where fitting. Past suggestions have included using environmentally friendly dinnerware and separating our waste into composting, recycling, and trash. We have also recommended speakers, such as Sister Judy, who shared her experiences with immigrants at the Texas border. We continue to research the local charities/non-profits and recommend the division of our charity funds. We would welcome more members to our committee; however, to join us, parishioners have to know who we are. And, this is true for all the committees. Therefore, through our Parish Council representative, we make the following recommendation: to meet the need for parishioners to be informed about the Newman Parish Councils and committees, we request that a description of each committee as well as the names of the people on those councils/committees, along with a contact name and email, be included in one of the monthly email newsletters and posted on the Newman Parish website. This will help all understand the structure of the parish, who to contact with a particular need, and information about areas where parishioners may have an interest in serving the parish.
 - b. **Welcoming Statement**. It is a common practice for councils/committees to include their mission statement or purpose on their minutes and correspondence. We can place the diocesan description for Parish Peace and Justice Committees and our welcoming statement at the top of our minutes each month. And we can invite people to join us! We will begin this practice with our November, 2022, 1minutes. While this Welcoming statement is currently for the Peace and Justice Committee, a long term goal is for an all inclusive welcoming statement for the parish.
- 5. **Questions for Fr. Dan**. Ken volunteered to ask the following questions of Father Dan via email. Here is a summary of the email responses.
 - a. Will the \$75 envelope be sent out even if there is no Annual Appeal this year? If not, where will the funds come from? The **charity collection envelope** will go out as usual. We will ask this follow-up question: If needed, where will additional funds come from?
 - b. Are the pastoral council meetings open to any parishioner to attend? Must they be on the agenda? The Parish Council meetings are informal and not open to all parishioners. If there is a concern that requires additional people, a special meeting, established in a timely manner, could be held.
 - c. Where do the funds come from if a diocese has to settle an abuse lawsuit? In the past, insurance companies have paid approximately 90% of the costs. Other funding has been through sale of diocesan-owned land. Parish property or funds would not be used for this purpose.
